Business Arising

TIG – Why do RAMS not contribute to the maintenance of Lynwood Park? Why are rego fees going up but we are granting \$80,000 to RAMS? They are not part of us.

They take players from clubs and cover any deposits already paid.

Rob Milne declared a conflict of interest with his child involved at RAMS.

DL – RAMS are part of us. The Association owns and runs RAMS for the last 30 years. A large percentage of players in RAMS do come from our Association Clubs, it is a representative pathway for them.

The Association is the hirer for Lynwood Park to ensure clubs have access to the ground when we need. We try to get as many clubs on the ground as possible for trials, finals and during the season with ground closures. If RAMS were the hirer, we may not be able to do that.

TIG – Why do they have their own bank account and ABN? Why can we not see their financial statements? Members should be able to vote on the grant they receive.

Life Member Kerrie Gale requested the TIG cease this line of questioning,

believing it was disrespectful to the member elected Board.

Rod Ciantar (TIG President) apologised to the Board if any offence was caused by the questioning.

Rob Laws – They are set up separately from the Association as it is a requirement by FNSW. Similar arguments were raised 30 years ago. Look at it as an investment in development not as just as spend. RAMS are the flagship for the Macarthur area.

DL – The Board approves the grant and the grant for 2023 has already been approved. TIG, earlier this year, approached the GM and the Board for a split of the grant to support their own NPL programmes.

Salv – Our Constitution does not allow the MFA to support the TIG financially as the club functions as one entity as both a community and NPL club.

TIG – Why can't they be financially independent after 30 years?

That is a question for RAMS.

ESC – How much of the grant is split between AYL and RAMS?

SAP and AYL are self-funding programs and do not require support of the grant.

PIC – \$1.4 million retained, are there any projects or subsidies for C License?

The number has come down, that was as of 30 June. We have set aside half a million for projects – the new competition management system, an extra staff member, and a joint investment with Southern Districts for marketing. We already offer subsidies for coaching courses, including the C License. Hoping to find out by Christmas regarding the West Invest grant which if successful, we have committed \$250K to.

# COMPETITION MANAGER'S REPORT



**STEVE CARROLL**  
Competitions Manager

***After what was a challenging few years for the sport, with the impact of COVID-19 and wet weather, we were finally able to deliver a complete football season with no cancelled matches.***

A total of 11,285 registered players, which is an Association record, played across 908 teams, participating in 109 competitions during the 2023 season. Yes, there was disruption to the original scheduling through the Women's World Cup, but all matches were moved and played without the loss of any competition fixtures, and we thank the Clubs and the teams for their support during that period.

Season 2023 saw the introduction of the Super League concept, a joint arrangement with our neighbouring Association, Southern Districts.

The Super League competitions were established for male teams in Division 1 of the Under-14, Under-15, and Under-16 age groups. The primary objective was to provide high-quality competition in youth Division 1 leagues, as the MFA had only a few teams in each of those leagues that were genuinely of Division 1 calibre. This initiative sought to enhance the player experience in Division 1 while also having a positive impact on the lower divisions. Otherwise, lower-division teams would have been expected to compete in competitions above their skill level.

MFA teams won the Premiership and Championship in each of the three competitions which is a true testament to the strength of the MFA – congratulations to each of those winning teams and all our teams in the Super League who all performed to a high level confirming their standings as one of the premier teams in division one in those age groups.

We sent out a feedback survey at the conclusion of the Super League competitions and the results highlighted that the experience was a positive one and each respondent was supportive of continuing with the concept in 2024.

SDSFA is also keen to continue with the jointly managed competitions that will feature in our 2024 competition offering (Super League will be reviewed annually and hopefully in time the MFA will have sufficient strong teams to conduct its own division one league competitions).

SDSFA did get one back on us by taking out the Women's M-League championship, but Tahmoor proved to be the strongest team across the season proper by taking out the Premiership in a tightly fought battle with the Premiers, AC United.

In the Men's M-League competitions, and in another closely fought battle, Camden Tigers ultimately took out the ML1 competition over Gunners, who turned the tide in the Grand Final by taking out the Championship in a highly quality match to finish the ML1 season.

Camden Tigers proved too strong in the M-League Reserves competition by winning the Grand Final comfortably, however, it was Harrington United who finished one point clear of the Champions in the Premiership battle to win by one point over Tigers.

Harrington United led the Colts competition from start to end ultimately taking out the Premiership well clear of the next-placed team however were unable to take that winning form into the finals where Narellan Rangers proved too strong over Camden Falcons in the Grand Final.

The Grand Final weekends were highly successful events, and many great matches resulted. We thank Narellan for hosting at Nott Oval and Campbelltown Uniting Church for hosting at Lynwood – positive feedback was received regarding both venues which is a high praise for all the efforts put in by the committees and volunteers at those Clubs.

The Division 1 Grade Finals were again played at Lynwood Stadium, with the All-Age Women's finals across all divisions also being recognised by playing their finals at Lynwood Stadium.

We thank our hardworking volunteers (Board and CMC), plus staff, who assisted at each of the Grand Final venues over the two weekends.

The Gala Days for our minis were held across five venues and we thank Eschol Park, Ingleburn, Harrington, Collegians, Bradbury, and St Marys Eagle Vale (hosted both U10s and U11s) for taking on the difficult hosting challenges.



Big crowds, many matches and many happy participants were the results at each of the Gala days, so again a big thank you to the host Clubs and to every club supporting these end-of-season days for our mini teams.

Our Clubs gave a good account of themselves in the Champions of Champions tournament to conclude the season, with both Harrington United U21 Men and Eschol Park Under 16 Girls winning through to the semi-final stage in their respective competitions. The highlight of the tournament was in Eschol Park playing their way to the Grand Final in the U14 Boys. Whilst ultimately unsuccessful, the Eschol Park team had a season to be proud of, and to finish as the 2nd best team in their age group across the state was a tremendous effort.

In the earlier season State Cup, the MFA had mixed results, with the best-performed team being the Eschol Park U14 Girls team who progressed through to the final round of 8. A great effort considering the high calibre of teams participating in that age group.



As noted in the opening sentence of this report, total player numbers for 2023 were at 11,285, an increase of 1,303 or 13% over total 2022 player numbers. This total is a record for player numbers and was up 484 on our previous record set in 2021.

The breakup of registrations saw:

- Minis: 5,099 (highest number ever, and a net increase of 648 over 2022 numbers)
- Juniors: 2,853 (not our highest recorded player numbers in this age category but a sizeable increase of 367 which is a growth of 15% on the 2022 registration numbers)
- Seniors: 3,333 (2nd highest ever, and up 288 or 9% on 2022)
- Overall Female player numbers fell slightly against total player numbers which represented 19% of total player numbers (down from 21% in 2022), however, there was actually a moderate increase of total female players in 2023 of 57 players. The biggest fall in female players was in the senior category with a total drop of 109 players but this was supplemented by increases in both Minis (95 players) and Juniors (71 players) so augurs well for the future of female participation if we can continue to retain and grow in each of these categories.



Throughout 2023, we organized 109 competitions for a total of 908 teams. Female teams accounted for 16% of this number. This represents the second-highest number of competitions ever offered by our Association. Our competition offering is diverse and adaptable to the ever-changing dynamics of the area and the sport in general.

2023 saw the introduction of electronic match cards through our new competition management system partner, Squadi, and there is no hiding that the implementation was initially far from ideal. During the season, there were major challenges with the data feed from Play Football to Squadi. These issues arose because Football Australia was either unable or unwilling to release player data in a timely manner, citing privacy concerns. Workarounds were implemented to address these obstacles, and by mid-year, many of the issues had been resolved. However, until Football Australia can fix their data feed issues with competition management systems such as Squadi and Dribl, there is a risk that these issues may persist. We are hopeful that the implemented fixes will prevent many of the negative concerns and issues encountered this year.

We are also optimistic that the problems related to creating competitions will be resolved soon. Based on recent updates and testing, it appears that many of the issues identified with the permanent updates will be resolved, which should address most of the concerns.

Despite the issues this season, the system is ultimately delivering, and the experience will continue to improve as our relationship with Squadi continues to evolve.

In closing, I take this opportunity to pass on my sincere thanks to the Board of the MFA, the MFA General Manager and the MFA staff, plus the hardworking members of the Competitions Management Committee for their unwavering support this season. And lastly, but certainly not least, I also thank all the MFA member Clubs and the volunteers within each for their support, understanding and commitment to MFA and the game of football generally. The game would not operate without the invaluable support and commitment of all these individuals!



# COMMUNITY FOOTBALL MANAGER'S REPORT

***In my third season at the helm, finally enjoying an uninterrupted campaign, coach and player development has achieved unprecedented heights, further fuelling the exponential growth of the Macarthur football culture.***

## **Coach Education Courses and Workshops**

Having expanded our workforce of Community Coach Developers over the past couple of seasons, we successfully implemented a more structured approach to delivering Coaching Courses in 2023. This approach aimed to enhance accessibility by running more courses at local clubs alongside our MFA hybrid model of online and in-person delivery, especially flooding the market in the crucial pre-season and early season months of February to April.

This season, the MFA set a record by delivering 19 community courses, with 232 coaches completing one or more community coaching certificates, surpassing the previous best in 2021 of 175 coaches. Heartfelt thanks and congratulations go to all clubs that hosted a coach education course in 2023, showcasing the grassroots commitment to coach and player development:

The MiniRoos Certificate proved to be the most sought-after, with 12 courses delivered and 137 participants completing their accreditation.

This introductory coaching course is crucial to ensuring children in the U6-U8 leagues have the best possible experience through quality coaching.

The MFA also continued the Skill Training Certificate with an impressive six courses, with 87 coaches completing the modified course. This course, modified in 2022 to maximise engagement, positions us ahead of the curve as we gear up to deliver Skill Training Workshops online in 2024, aligning with the changing landscape of Coach Education.

The Game Training Certificate, focusing on upskilling coaches for 11-a-side football, recorded a more modest participation rate, with eight coaches completing a single course early in the year. The MFA plans to introduce Game Training Workshops in 2024, further expanding online opportunities for members to be educated on 11-a-side football principles and tactical coaching points.

In addition to coaching courses, the MFA hosted two workshops during the year to provide further coach development opportunities. In May, Ken Greenhead, Football Australia Goalkeeper Coach Developer, delivered a Community Goalkeeping Workshop. Lynwood Park also hosted the Football NSW South Zone Advanced Coaching Expo in August, with 46 coaches in attendance, benefiting from sessions and presentations by Football NSW instructors.

While the MFA could not host an FA/AFC 'C' Licence in 2023 due to Football Australia's coach education revamp, a course has been booked and confirmed in March 2024 under the new FA/AFC C Diploma format, with 24 local coaches already enrolled.

## **Digital Coach Development**

In the realm of digital coach development, 2023 witnessed the MFA strengthening its global ties with MOJO from the USA, Sport Session Planner, and the Coaches Voice from Europe. These digital partnerships have revolutionised our coaching landscape.

With MOJO as the MFA's official grassroots coaching app, user numbers increased to a total of approximately 650. Members connected to their local Macarthur club enjoyed an additional 15 session plans for three different age groups, following the Football Australia and Macarthur Football curriculum. This unprecedented access allows coaches and members to develop themselves and their players through a free app at their fingertips.

Simultaneously, our collaboration with the Coaches Voice group, featuring the Sport Session Planner platform, has thrived, offering an expanding repertoire of high-quality sessions.

In 2023, Representative Technical Directors leveraged their Coaches Voice Academy accounts, immersing themselves in insights gleaned from premier coaching environments worldwide, including those of Arsenal and Tottenham Academies. Additionally, Sport Session Planner played a pivotal role in streamlining our program delivery, enhancing initiatives like the ADP. The MFA strategically crafted best-practice sessions, subsequently shared with ADP coaches and community coaches during club visits, courses, and workshops. Currently, we boast 85 Sport Session Planner subscriptions and 12 Coaches Voice subscriptions, reinforcing our commitment to providing cutting-edge coaching resources to our dynamic community.

### **Coaching Support & Mentorship Programs**

In 2023, the rejuvenated Community Coach Development Program (CCDP), formerly CCC, kicked off with a successful pre-season workshop attended by representatives from Camden Falcons FC, Gunners SC, Appin United SC, Eschol Park FC, and Campbelltown Collegians FC. Participants gained essential insights into coach development and valuable resources for the ensuing winter season. The primary focus remained on empowering local clubs to leverage the unprecedented benefits of the MOJO app within their communities.

Female Coach Development in 2023 exceeded expectations, with 60 females completing one or more coaching certificates. The MFA conducted three groundbreaking Female-Only courses, comprising two MiniRoos Certificates and one Skill Training Certificate. The Female Coach Development Program (FCDP) experienced substantial growth, with 38 dynamic ladies actively engaging in the WhatsApp Group chat designed exclusively for female coaches in Macarthur. The program commenced the year with a joint "Kick-Off" workshop alongside its Eastern Suburbs counterpart, fostering a sense of community and collaboration. Crucially, the FCDP serves as a safe haven, facilitating open discussions about coaching experiences and providing tailored updates on opportunities.

In alignment with Football NSW's commitment to enhancing female coaching competency statewide, Macarthur FA proudly participated in the Youth Female Coach Development Program (YFCDP).





Supported by the NSW Government's 'Her Sport Her Way Grant,' this initiative aimed to empower local associations in bolstering the ranks of qualified female coaches.

An impressive cohort of 11 successful applicants emerged, with four of these coaches seamlessly integrating into the MFA's Community Coaching team. Their contributions spanned diverse programs, including the Macarthur FC Holiday Clinics and the Association Development Program (ADP). This collective journey reflects our unwavering commitment to fostering a vibrant and inclusive football community in Macarthur.

### **Association Development Program (ADP)**

In 2023, our Association Development Program (ADP) soared to new heights, recording a remarkable 365 registered participants—a testament to its growing impact. The ADP maintained its traditional Winter 20-week format, witnessing unprecedented success with the introduction of a Girls Development Program at Lynwood Park. Thirty-one girls experienced a thriving all-female environment, with Camden Falcons FC and Harrington United FC hosting additional ADP sessions at their venues. Positive feedback poured in from parents, underscoring the ADP's role as a crucial stepping stone for numerous children transitioning to representative programs, including Macarthur Rams FC and Macarthur FA SAP teams.

Celebrating success stories is now a priority, with players like Beau Edwards and Jack Strong, nurtured through the ADP, sharing their journeys on the MFA website and social media pages.

Following the triumphant Winter ADP, the Summer ADP made a resounding return in an 8-week format at the home grounds of Gregory Hills FC and Glenfield Lions FC. Notably, the Summer ADP experienced a remarkable 129.41% surge in participant numbers, leaping from 68 in 2022 to an impressive 156 in 2023. Both programs successfully organised female-only groups, attracting 28 females across the two venues.

### **Holiday Clinics & Participation Programs**

Our commitment to fostering football enthusiasm continued through school holiday clinics, delivered in partnership with Macarthur FC. Participation reached new heights, with 534 registrations for Mixed 2-Day, Mixed 1-Day, and 1-Day Girls Only Clinics held at Nott Oval and Lynwood Park throughout the year. Female participation flourished, with 145 girls engaging in multiple clinics.

Building on the success of the inaugural gala days in 2022, we hosted the July School Holiday MiniRoos Gala Days once again in 2023. Eighty-two teams, spanning U6 to U11 age groups, showcased their skills at Lynwood Park, providing over 600 participants with an extended opportunity for football enjoyment.

2023 marked the triumphant return of Football Australia's MiniRoos Kick-Off programs to the Macarthur region, with Ingleburn Eagles SC and Glenfield Lions FC spearheading initiatives that were bolstered by the MFA's Community Coaching Team. These programs not only provided a welcoming and enjoyable introduction to football for new participants but also fostered a continued passion for the sport among existing players. In 2023, a total of 95 participants reaped the benefits of the MiniRoos Kick-Off program, each receiving a MiniRoos Participant Pack from Football Australia.

One of 2023's most heartwarming stories was the inaugural Daughters and Dads Football program, hosted by Camden Falcons FC with MFA support. Twenty-two families participated, fostering quality time between father figures and young girls through football, promoting social skills, and emphasising the importance of persistence. After a successful Term 3 program, Camden Falcons FC plans to continue the Daughters and Dads program in Term 1 of 2024.

In conclusion, I want to express my heartfelt thanks to all the fantastic clubs, volunteers, players, coaches, and parents for your incredible support throughout 2023. Looking ahead, I'm genuinely excited about the 2024 season, anticipating further success with the expanding M-SAP League and the continuous growth of our initiatives.

# Notes to the Financial Statements

Macarthur Football Association Inc  
For the year ended 30 June 2023

## Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report includes the financial statements and notes of Macarthur Football Association Inc.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on the date resolved by the directors of the association.

## Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Associations Incorporation Act 2009. The association is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

### 1. Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

### 2. Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

The association measures some of its assets and liabilities at fair value on either a recurring or non-recurring basis, depending on the requirements of the applicable Accounting Standard. "Fair value" is the price the association would receive to sell an asset or would have to pay to transfer a liability in an orderly (ie unforced) transaction between independent, knowledgeable and willing market participants at the measurement date.

As fair value is a market-based measure, the closest equivalent observable market pricing information is used to determine fair value. Adjustments to market values may be made having regard to the characteristics of the specific asset or liability. The fair values of assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market are determined using one or more valuation



techniques. These valuation techniques maximise, to the extent possible, the use of observable market data.

To the extent possible, market information is extracted from the principal market for the asset or liability (ie the market with the greatest volume and level of activity for the asset or liability). In the absence of such a market, market information is extracted from the most advantageous market available to the entity at the end of the reporting period (ie the market that maximises the receipts from the sale of the asset or minimises the payments made to transfer the liability, after taking into account transaction costs and transport costs).

For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement also takes into account a market participant's ability to use the asset in its highest and best use or to sell it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The fair value of liabilities and the entity's own equity instruments (excluding those related to share-based payment arrangements) may be valued, where there is no observable market price in relation to the transfer of such financial instruments, by reference to observable market information where such instruments are held as assets. Where this information is not available, other valuation techniques are adopted and, where significant, are detailed in the respective note to the financial statements.

### 3. Trade & Other Receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The association has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

### 4. Fair Value of Assets

Each class of plant and equipment is measured at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

#### Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis.

## 5. Property, Plant & Equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is measured at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

### Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis.

### Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all other property, plant and equipment is depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held available for use, consistent with the estimated consumption of the economic benefits embodied in the asset.

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

## 6. Financial Instruments

### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Association commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified as fair value through profit or loss, in which case transaction costs are immediately recognised as expenses in profit or loss.

### Classification of financial assets

Financial assets recognised by the Association are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, subject to their classification and whether the Association irrevocably designates the financial asset on initial recognition at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVtOCI) in accordance with the relevant criteria in AASB 9.

Financial assets not irrevocably designated on initial recognition at FVtOCI are classified as subsequently measured at amortised cost, FVtOCI or fair value through profit or loss (FVtPL) on the basis of both:

- (a) the Association's business model for managing the financial assets; and
- (b) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

#### Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities classified as held for trading, contingent consideration payable by the Association for the acquisition of a business, and financial liabilities designated at FVtPL, are subsequently measured at fair value.

All other financial liabilities recognised by the Association are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

## 7. Employee Benefits

### Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries and sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

### Other long-term employee benefits

Provision is made for employees' long service leave and annual leave entitlements not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on corporate bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Upon the remeasurement of obligations for other long-term employee benefits, the net change in the obligation is recognised in profit or loss as a part of employee benefits expense.

The association's obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current provisions in its statement of financial position, except where the association does not have an



unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are presented as current provisions.

## 8. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured using the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

## 9. Cash & Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

## 10. Trade And Other Payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the association prior to the end of the financial period and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

## 11. Revenue Recognition

### Revenue from contracts with customers

#### Revenue policy

The association derives revenue from operating football club competitions for 23 member clubs across Campbelltown, Camden and Wollondilly local government areas. Revenue is recognised as, or, when goods or services are transferred to the customer, and is measured at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association expects to be entitled in exchange for the goods or services.

#### Registration and nomination fees

These are recognised as revenue when no significant uncertainty as to its collectability exists, if the fee relates only to membership and all other services or products are paid for separately, or if there is a separate annual subscription. The fees are recognised on a basis that reflects the timing, nature and value of the benefit provided if the fee entitles the member to services to be provided during the period.

#### Clinic income

Revenue from events is recognised in the period in which the events are held.

#### Receivables from contracts with customers

A receivable from a contract with a customer represents the Association's unconditional right to consideration arising from the transfer of goods or services to the customer (i.e., only the passage of time is required before payment of the consideration is due). Subsequent to initial

recognition, receivables from contracts with customers are measured at amortised cost and are tested for impairment.

### **Contract liabilities**

A contract liability represents the Association's obligation to transfer goods or services to the customer for which the Association has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. Amounts recorded as contract liabilities are subsequently recognised as revenue when the Association transfers the contracted goods or services to the customer.

### **Interest**

Interest revenue is measured in accordance with the effective interest method.

All revenue is measured net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

## **12. Current Tax Liabilities**

### **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

## **13. Comparative Figures**

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial period.

## 14. New and Amended Accounting Standards Adopted by the Entity

The entity has adopted AASB 1060: General Purpose Financial Statements – Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities. The Standard, which sets out a new separate disclosure Standard to be applied by all entities that are reporting under Tier 2 of the Differential Reporting Framework in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting, replaces the previous Reduced Disclosure Requirements (SD) framework. The application of this standard has resulted in reductions in disclosures compared to SD in Revenue, Leases and Financial Instruments; however has resulted in new and/or increased disclosures in areas such as Audit Fees and Related Parties.

### Change In Accounting Policy

The directors declare that there have been no other changes to any accounting policies for the period ended 30 June 2023.

### Presentation Currency

All amounts in these financial statements are presented in Australian Dollars (\$AUD).

### Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated in the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and internally.

The directors have determined that there are no significant risks causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial period.

### Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The directors have taken into account all available information about the future, which is at least, but is not limited to, twelve months from 30 June 2023.

When the directors are aware, in making the assessment, of material uncertainties related to events or conditions that cast significant doubt upon the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, the directors shall disclose those uncertainties.

### Current / Non-Current Distinction

Assets have been classified as current when the directors: Expects to realise the asset, or intends to sell or consume it, in the entity's normal operating cycle; Holds the asset primarily for the purpose of trading; Expects to realise the asset within twelve months after the reporting date;



or The asset is cash or a cash equivalent, unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

Liabilities have been classified as current when the directors: Expects to settle the liability in the entity's normal operating cycle;

Holds the liability primarily for the purpose of trading; Confirms the liability is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting date; or Does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after reporting date.

### Assets Classified As Held For Sale

The directors confirm that at 30 June 2023 the association does not hold any assets that are classified as being held for sale.

Should an asset be classified as held for sale, the directors will: Provide a description of the asset(s) or the group of assets and liabilities; and Provide a description of the facts and circumstances of the sale, or leading to the expected disposal, and the expected manner and timing of that disposal.

### Reclassification of Term Deposit

A term deposit with a balance of \$300,000.00, that was disclosed as a financial asset in 2022, has been reclassified to Cash at Bank. The term deposit has a term to maturity of three months. The Cash Flow Statement has been updated to reflect the reclassification.

### Classification Of Expenses

For the period ended 30 June 2023 the directors present the expenses based on the nature or function of these expenses, as this classification was deemed as more reliable and more relevant.

### Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

#### Qualified Opinion

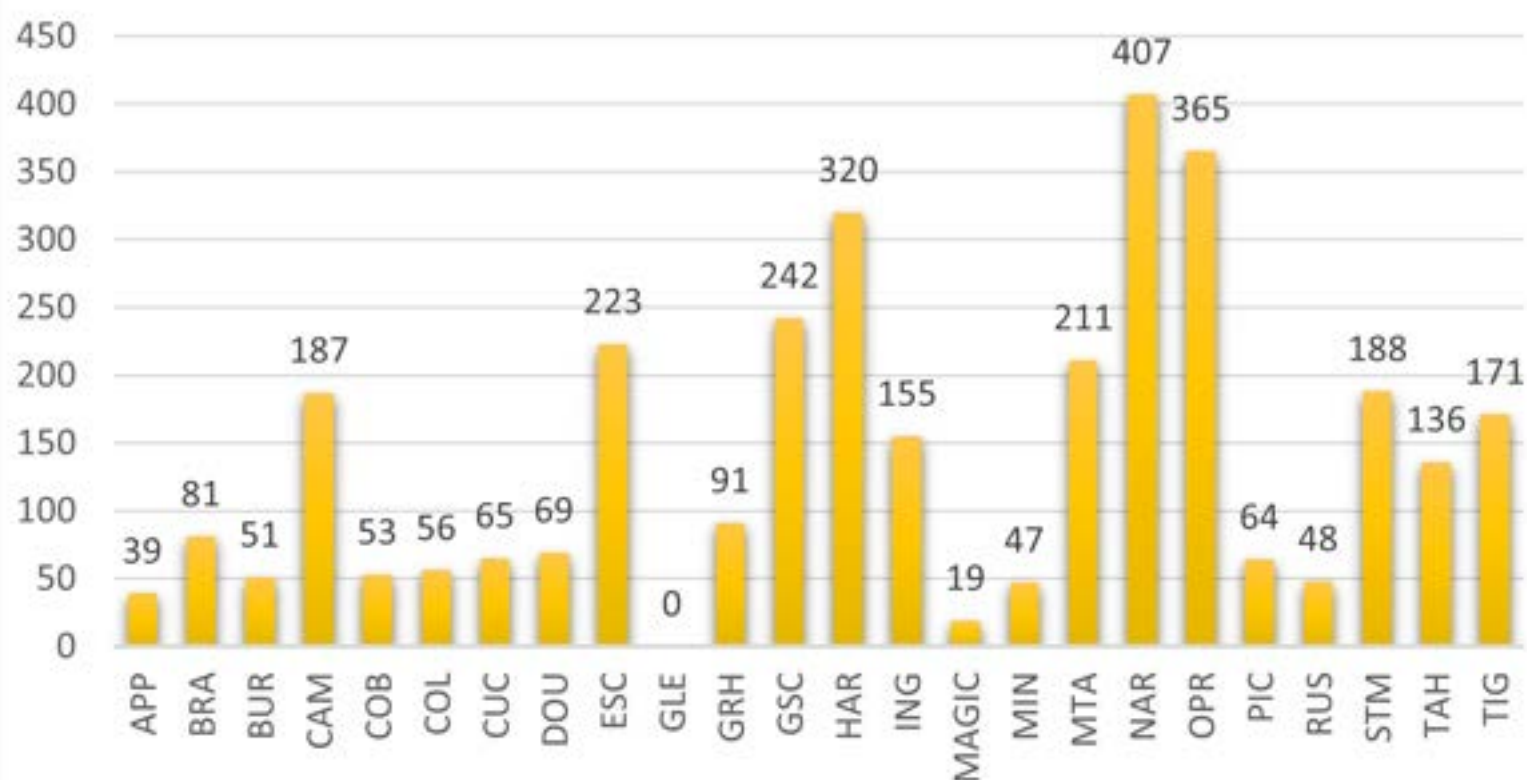
